Present also to witness the baptism and receive the tributes of the guests was Line Renaud herself, the celebrated and charming French singing star for whom the rose is named.

Mrs. Feuillatze, Prêlat des Salettes, baptized the new floral variety. "Line Renaud" is a creation of the Grandes Roserades du val de la Loire, one of the oldest and largest nurseries in the Orleans area. According to M. Hendricks, director of the nurseries, "Line" is the successful culmination of years of careful cultivation and cross-breeding on his 120 acre establishment in the heart of the Loire Valley, horticultural center of France.

SFC Adler Awarded Bronze Star Medal

Wednesday evening's weekly retreat ceremony at Coligny Caserne was highlighted by a presentation of the Bronze Star medal to SFC Arthur Adler. The medal was presented by Lt Col Harley W. Chase, Orin Executive Officer.

SFC Adler, of Hq Co, 7965 AU, and Orin FPO staff writer, received the award for participation against the armed enemy on March 24, 1945, during the Rhine Jump Campaign during World War II. At that time he was a member of the 507th Parachute Infantry Regiment of the 17th Airborne Division.

The 33-year old Orin soldier now has been awarded nine medals, including the Purple Heart, the Good Conduct Medal with one clasp, the American Defense Medal Service Medal with Bronze Star, the American Campaign Medal, the European-African-Middle Eastern Campaign Medal with the Arrow Head and four battle stars, the World War II Victory Medal, the Army of Occupation Medal, and the National Defense Service Medal. He also has the Distinguished Unit Citation, the Parachutist Badge and the Combat Infantry Badge.

Adler came in the Army in Aug. 1940, and served two years in Panama. (Cont' on page 2, col. 4)

Things are up in the air in Orleans Installation as far as 114 selected personnel are concerned.

They are members who attended a 29 hour course of instruction in air transportability conducted earlier this week by a five man Air Force Team from the 5th Aerial Port Squadron, Neuberg, Germany.

These personnel are the first in ORIN to receive this instruction and will serve as training cadre for their units later on.

The course consisted of five major subjects; safety (air and ground), information on cargo aircraft, tie-downs, procedures for locating the center of gravity of vehicles and load planning.

Instruction was culminated at Bricy Air Base, a French airport outside of Orleans, where the students applied the two days of classroom

training into practical application by loading a C-123 cargo plane. Throughout the training safety factors were stressed and the students cautioned to rigidly observe all rules whether the aircraft was in flight or stationary on the ground. Emergency equipment, consisting of a parachute, life vest (Max Vest) and one man life raft (dinghy), to be used in case of a bail out, crash landing or ditching, was shown and their proper use demonstrated.

This was followed by a briefing on the types of cargo aircraft employed by the Air Force in which the capabilities of the C-54, C-119, C-121 and C-124 were discussed. The next phase was concerned with the employment of tie-down devices (cotton webbing, steel cables, chain and hook), and methods of determining amount of restraint against thrust that could be expected from them.

Orleans Triumphs Over La Rochelle Team 13-12

After chalking up a 13-12 victory over La Rochelle in their COM Z Conference football opener last Saturday, the Orleans Orlesians will meet the Chinoe Red Devils tomorrow afternoon in the first home game of the season starting at 2 o'clock at Stadium No. 1 in Starn.

Chinoe, although a 20-0 loser to the powerful Busse eleven last week, is rated as one of the strongest teams in the COM Z league. La Rochelle, on the other hand, is a team that has had a season and will probably be at full strength against the Orlesians. The Orin club came through the week's games with only a few minor injuries and is also expected to be in good shape for the contest.

Coaches Corky Johns and Fred Haid are expected to give starting assignments to Volna Martin and either Gary Wagner or Dave Hankins at halfback, Dave Cavitt, fullback; Bob Johnson, quarterback; Ed Fickelinger and Art McGee, ends; John McCarthy and Bob Miller, tackles; Lew Lawsted and Ed Martzke, O'Wolens, guards, and Bob Rupert at center. Johnson has been moved to the quarterback position to replace Dave Ruf and Jim Maher who still remain on the injured list.

Wagner Runs For 62

In last Saturday's opener, Orin track star Gary Wagner, making his first game at halfback, broke loose and sprinted for 62 yards the first time he had his hands on the ball to set up the game-winning touchdown for the Orlesians. Wagner took off on the Orleans 38 and was finally hauled down on the La Rochelle two-yard stripe. On the next play Johnson went over on a quarterback sneak to tie the game at 12-12. Cavitt then ran the extra point to give Orleans the one-point decision.

The Orlesians (Allback apparently fumbled the ball after the referee's whistle had sounded, and touched off a heated dispute on the extra-point play.

Orleans started things off early in the first quarter of the game by moving to the 7 yard line, making up five straight first downs after the opening kickoff. Cavitt then scored around right end to put the Orlesians in front 6-0, as a fumbled pass from center made the conversion attempt no good.

La Rochelle started a downfield march, after an exchange of the ball on downs, that ended in their own 10 yard line. In the 11th opening minutes of the second quarter the La Rochelle team scored

Orin Wins Tennis Title; Krone Singles Champ

For the second consecutive year Orin walked off with COM Z tennis honors as Morris Krone, of the local team, won the open class singles championship and Ralph Saylin, also of Orleans, was victorious in the senior division singles match.

Orleans registered 34 points in the five-day tournament to take first place over the remaining six COM Z teams. In second place was Western District of Basee, with 29, and Northern Basee, with 25, fourth.

Southern Basee, 15, fifth, South-eastern Adace and Northeastern Adace, tied with 12 points each. Champions captured the singles title by sidelining Martin McDaniel, of Western Basee, a 1955 semi-finalist, in the championship match, winning in straight sets, 6-2, 6-3 and 6-9 last Friday in the tournament's windy at the Vauresson Sports Arena in Bielefeld. The Orleans champion was never in trouble at any time in the title match as he led all the way, taking advantage of several faulty serves by the Western Basee runner-up.

Only two contestants participated in the senior division, and Saylin of Orleans took the singles match from Ben Vazquez, of Seine Area Command, winning in sets of 6-6, 6-1, 6-4 and 8-6.

McDaniel, singles runner-up, stood somewhat for his singles failure by teaming with Joe Cerato to annex the doubles crown for Western Basee. They defeated Bill Roberti and Stanley Cohen, both of Northern District Basee, 12-11, 6-3 and 6-3.

Members of the Orin open class champions team are: senior, John Gordon, Harry Halper, Manuel Blas, Gilman Bross, Edward Langford and Hovey Clark.

Seattle Bakers, US Military Team Win In Basketball Double-Header

Seattle's Buchanan's Bakers, 1956 American AAU basketball champions, opened a month's tour of Europe with a 72-38 victory over the Paris University Club, and the American All-Stars military team won over the Selection Orlesians 28-24 in a basketball double-header Tuesday evening at the Salle des Fetes in Orleans.

The Seattle team got off to a slow start against the Paris quintet and had difficulty in finding the hoop in the first half of the game, but with a 20-12 lead at the intermission. Powered by Ed Tucker, Daneyson, and Joe Cipriani, and Charlie Koon, the AAU champs started rolling in the third period and outscored the French team 42-21 in

the final half. In the preliminary game, the American military team of Orleans took an early lead over the Orlesians and led throughout the entire game. The winners were in front 19-18 at the end of the first quarter, 28-24 at the halftime stop, and stretched their lead to 42-21 at the end of three quarters before outscored 17-11 in the final quarter.

Orleans forward Renard was the game's leading scorer with 16 points, while hook-shot artist Jim Curtin led the American team with 14. Close behind Curtin was center John Kulowice who checked up 12 markers and guard Dick Hugh who registered 10. Sheldon and Rousseau of the French team scored eight points each.
