UNIFORM CHANGES PLANNED

Attention of all military personnel in Frankfurt Military Post is directed to the forthcoming changes in uniform regulations, effective Oct. 1. Most important will be the change in off-duty dress for officers as outlined in EUCOM Cir. No. 185 dated July 26, 1951, After 7 pm officers will wear the pink trousers, shade 54, and the green blouse, shade 53 will not be worn after 7 pm.

The wearing of the summer uniform by all personnel will cease on Oct. 15 as will the wearing of the shirt, wool, shade 33 as a substitute for the jacket, wool.

Civilian clothes may be worn by female personnel of the Anny Nuse Corps, Women's Army Corps, and Women's Medical Specialist Corps, during off-duty hours, Under the provisions of EUCOM Circular No. 60, military personnel may wear civilian sports clothes in Germany only while engaged in, or while travelling to and from, such activities, Such travel will be by the most direct route from the residence to the sports area and return. Overseas Mail

For Christmas daughter Christmas parcels from members of the Armed Forces overseas should be mailed between Oct. IS and Nov. 15, the Department of Defenses advises. Boxes headed overseas must be of double-faced corrugated card-board, strong wood, metal, or fiberboard. Each box should be securely tied with strong cord, and loose flaps should be sealed with gummed tape. Unless competely packed and tightly filled, boxes may be crushed.

Army considerably by 1921, there did not seem to be much need for an active Military Police Branch, and for the next twenty years little was done to change the system of police control,

Recognizing a definite need for effective control, the War Department appointed a planning board that met periodically during the 1920s and 1930s and several studies were conducted to plan for organization of a Military Police Corps in the event of another war.

The studies conduced by the planning board paid dividends because the rapid expansion of the Amy in 1940 and 1941 again made obvious the need for a unified and centrally directed military police organization. Special units were formed to handle various phases of police duty including criminal investigation, post and town patrol, combat duty, prisoner of war control and many others. On July 31, 1941 Major General Allen W. Cullion was directed by the Secretary of War to establish the Office of the Provost Marshal General and to form a Corps of Military Police.
