

## New Recreational Facilities Under Construction In Metz

METZ — At the rate that new sporting and recreational facilities are presently being constructed at the Metz Quartermaster Depot, one can almost wonder if personnel stationed here will have time enough to show up for their regular jobs.

Operations are presently ounder way at Colin Caserne for the renovation of one building into a post gymna-sium. Lt Joseph Wood, Post Engineer, stated that the project, due for completion by September, will be complete with hardwood basketball court, showers, lockers and seating for five hundred spectators.

At the same time, workers from the same French contractor, Lallemont and Piquet, are finishing up work at the local Special Services Bowling alley, which will provide those facilities with a badly-needed heating system as well as store rooms and rest rooms.

Outdoor sport enthusiasts need not feel that they have been forgotten. Construction will start in July at Tournebride on a number of outdoor recre-ational facilities. When work is completed about ninety days after the start of construction, the area will sport a new football field, encircled by a cinder track, two softball fields, a concrete basketball court, and four volleyball courts. And just in case personnel are still in doubt as to how to spend their spare moments, a new theater with Cinemascope screen is also due to go up in that area at the same time.

Construction of the new facilities at Tournebride will be undertaken by a company from the 294th Engineer Bn, pre-sently stationed at Kaiserslautern, Germany.

One hundred and eighty-one years ago, on 14 June 1775, the Second Continental Congress voted to establish an Army representing all of the 13 American colonies.

Word had reached the o-Congress, meeting in Phila-delphia, that Massachussetts

### Metz Sp Svcs Tour Takes 16 Men To Trier, Germany

METZ - Sixteen men from the Metz Quartermaster Depot toured Trier, Germany, last weekend, on one of the many trips scheduled throughout France, Germany and Luxembourg by the Metz Special Services Club. Miss Louise Schill-ing of the Club acted as the group's hostess.

Some of the interesting sites the group saw were the Cathedral of St Pauli, the catacombs of St Pauli, the Porti Nigra, the surrounding gardens and palace, the old Roman gate and the ruins of the famed Roman baths. On the way to Trier the group stopped to take pictures of a procession honoring St. Theresa. militiamen had repelled the British regulars who were on their way to Boston. Many delegates wanted to declare immediate independence from the British crown; others doubted whether such immediate action would be wise.

After days of debate, the de-legates finally reached agreement on one point - if independence was ever to be won, the colonies would need an Army.

Thus, on 14 June 1775, the Congress authorized the cre-ation of ten rifle companies; elsewhere on this page you will find the text of the order that created our Army.

Since its founding 181 years ago, the United States Army has served the nation continuously. It is the oldest of the military forces and the only one that has remained on an active status since the Revolutionary

### This Resolution By Continental Congress Was Army's Birthday Announcement, 14 June 1775

"Resolved, that six companies of expert riflemen be immediately roised in Pennsylvania, two in Maryland, and two in Virginia; that each company consist of a captain, three lieutenants, four sergeants, four corporals, a drummer, or trumpeter, and sixty-eight

"That each company as soon as completed, shall march and join

"That each company as soon as completed, shall march and join the Army near Boston, to be there employed as light infantry under the command of the chief Officer in that army.

"That the pay of the Officers and privates be as follow, viz, a captain, at 20 dollars; per month; a lieutenant at 13 1/3 dollars; a serjeant at 8 dollars; a corporal at 7 1/3 dollars; furnmer or (trumpeter) at 7 1/3 dollars; privates 6 2/3 dollars; to find their own arms and cloaths."

(The "Army" mentioned in the resolution as already being in the area of Boston was actually militia recruits by individual states. The force called into being by the resolution was the first to be raised under Congressional auspices and thus marks the real beginning of the Army.) (AFPS)

## **Voting Is Even More Important** For Armed Forces Personnel

Voting for a representative is a serious business. It is both a right and a duty. We were not relieved of this duty when we entered service. If anything, as members of the Armed Forces, we ought to be more conscious of our responsibilities as citizens.

Americans have fought to | protect their right to vote, but they are not always so eager when it comes to using it.

We all agree that every ci-tizen should exercise his right to vote. Yet, except when there is a presidential election, as many as sixty percent of those who are eligible to vote stay away from the polls. The percentage of servicemen not voting is undoubtedly higher.

We in the Armed Forces cannot excuse ourselves for failing to vote in state, local or national elections because we are away from home. Most of us expect to return home upon

retirement or separation from the service. Those who are career members of the Armed Forces seldom sever home ties your families must live somewhere while you are separated by official duties - some may own property or inherit property back home. We have many good reasons for wanting good government in our home communities, even though we many now be stationed thousands of miles away.

This important problem will be discussed during your Command Conference for the week beginning 11 June under the general title of "Your Representative In Government."



AN IDEA has been kicking around in the minds of the world's best political theorists for hundreds of years: just governments derive their powers from the consent of the governed. The idea is the cornerstone of our Declaration of Independence, although Thomas Jefferson, who was largely responsible for the document, was not the first to express the idea.

Down through the 170 years or so of our existence, we Americans

bown through the 170 years or so of our existence, we Americans have given life to this idea every time we entered a voting booth or held a town meeting. "Consent" came to mean the will of the majority; the "governed," every citizen.

During these 170 years, we have seen governments based on other notions tumble like the walls of Jericho. Absolute monarchies

-government by the "consent" of one man, the king or tsarhave all but disappeared. Other totalitarian varieties—government by "consent" of a Fuehrer or Duce—have also been given the gate. Some totalitarian forms are still around but their lives and the

lives of their leaders always are in doubt. This must be so when

a government mutes the voice of its people.

We servicemen-no matter how far from Washington or the state capital—will have an opportunity to express our "consent" by voting this year. If our way of life is to rest on a firm, democratic base, we must cast a well-considered vote. (AFPS).

## To Make Life Difficult But Serve As Guide

God did not give us His Ten Commandments in order to make life difficult for His rational creatures. This is difficult to tell a modern reader. Some people, as soon as they hear the word commandment, decide at once: "Not for me. Here comes the kill-joy stuff. Life is dull enough without some chaplain giving us a lot of rules to spoil our fun." Then we dig up that old wisecrack about: "Everything I like to do is either illegal, immoral or fattening." They figure that commandments and happiness don't mix.

They are wrong. God gave us these ten Rules to make us happy. God created us, and knows to a perfection what we need to be happy. He also knows what would hurt our happiness. So God has worked out in detail ten Laws to protect us. They are like the "How to Drive Your Car" instructions you receive when you get a new car. The manufacturer tells you what rules to follow for maximum performance and satisfactory driving. God, in his ten Rules, tells us how to live here and hereafter.

God's ten Rules are not mere saying or whims by someone who wants to keep us from having fun. They are an expression of what we are like inside. can't live correctly, I can't live the way I ought, unless there is law and order around me. How am I to preserve my life, property or home if I am to be plagued by killers, thieves and home-wreckers? But if I keep the Ten Commandments I am not free to do as I please. Of course not. Freedom must not be confused with license. License - everybody doing as he pleases - leads to chaos. Freedom - being able to do as I ought to do - leads to happiness and peace. — by Chaplain (Lt) Harold J. Paul.

## French Offs, Educators Chat At Nancy's 'Meet The People'

NANCY — The Nancy Ord-nance Depot Service Club presented a "Meet The People" program recently. Members of guest panel included M. and Mme. Blanchot, Instructors in English at the College Municipal de Jeunes Filles and College de Garcons at Toul, and Lieutenant Magny, of the 15th RGA. Present as observers were Colonel Montangier, Commandant of the 15th RGA, and Col Robert E. Peters, Commanding Officer, NOD.

The purpose of the panel was to describe and discuss the professional fields with which each guest was connected and show the similarities and differences between related fields in the United States.

Lt. Magny was the first to speak. He described the organization of the French Army and gave a brief description of a day in the life of the average French soldier. The main differences shown between the French and the US Armies were with regard to pay, uniform regulations, duty hours, length of service, and

ranking of personnel.

M. and Mme. Blanchot then explained the French educational system and pointed out the differences between our system and the French. A French child starts his education in the Ecole Premiere, at which he stays until he is approximately 10 to 11 years old. He then starts his Secondary School, or College, after which, if he successfully completes his examinations, he is eligible for entrance to any University in France. Once a student has entered the University. he is required to take five final examinations, over a period of three to four years, depending on his efforts. At the end of this first year, the student takes one examination and, if he passes it successfully, he starts his second year. From the second year on, he must take one, but not more than two, final examinations at the end of each scholastic year. Thus a student may finish his University and be awarded his degree in a minimum of three years. He may not remain longer than four years for his first degree. A few of the other differences between the French student and his American counterpart are that the French student is not required to attend a minimum percentage of lectures for a given semester, receives everything, except lodging and board, free, and leads a comparatively undeveloped social life.

The evening was terminated with refreshments provided by the Service Club.

A letter from Hq, Com Z, read in part: "It should be obvious that any overloading of a vehicle, particularly crowding of the front seat which interferes with the operation...constitutes a definite unsafe driving practice within the meaning of Com Z Circular 385-156."
