### SFC Adler Awarded Bronze Star Medal

ceremony at Coligny Caserne was highlighted by a presentation of the Bronze Star medal to SFC Arthur Adler. The medal was presented by Lt Col Hurley W Chase, Orin Execu-

SFC Adler, of Hq Co, 7986 AU, and Orin PIO staff writer, received the sward for participation against the armed enemy on March 24, 1945, during the Rhine Jump Campaign during World War II. At that time he was a member of the 507th Parachute Infantry Regiment of the 17th Air-borne Division

The 33-year old Orin soldier now has been awarded nine medals, in-cluding the Purple Heart, the Good Conduct Medal with one clasp, the American Defense Medal Service Conduct Medal with one clasp, the American Defense Medal Service Medal with Bronze Star, the Ameri-can Campaign Medal, the European-African-Middle Eastern Campaign Medal with the Arrow Head and four battle stars, the World War II Victory Medal, the Army of Occup-tion Medal, and the National Defen Service Medal. He also has the Dis-tinguished Unit Citation, the Parachutist Bades and the Combat Infantry Badge.

Things are up in the air in Or-leans Installation as far as 114 selec-ted personnel ted personnel are concerned.
They are members who attended a 20 hour course of instruction in air transportability conducted earlier this week by a five man Air Force Team from the 5th Aerial Port Squadron, Neudiberg, Germany.
These personnel are the first in ORIN to receive this instruction and will serve as training cadre for their units later on

units later on.

The course consisted of five major subjects; safety (air and ground), information on cargo aircraft, tiedowns, procedures for locating the center of gravity of vehicles and load planning.

Instruction was culminated at Bri-ey Air Base, a French airport outside of Orleans, when the students applied the two days of classroom training into practical application by loading a C-123 cargo plane. Throughout the training safety fac-tors were stressed and the students

tors were stressed and the students cautioned to rigidly observe all rules whether the aircraft was in flight or stationary on the ground. Emergency equipment, consisting of a parachitut, life vest (Mac West) and a one man life raft (dinghy), to be used in case of a bail out, crash landing or ditching, was shown and their propuse demonstrated. This was followed by a briefing on

the types of cargo aircraft employed by the Air Force in which the capa-bilities of the C-54, C-119, C-123 and C-124 were discussed. The next phase was concerned with the employment of tie-down devices (cotton webbing or us-down devices (cotton wenning, steel cables, chain and hook), and methods of determining the amount of restraint against thrust that could be expected from them.
