Ficus or rubber plant has large oval leaves that are leathery and dark green. While they grow best in a warm, moist atmosphere, they do fairly well under normal household conditions of temmentaire and

humidity.
They can be grown in full sun or shade.Plant in regular potting soil, keep the soil moist and wipe the leaves with a wet cloth at frequent

intervals.

Palms Most palms are too large for use as house plants but two, namely Phoenix roebelini and Parlor Palm are small enough to use as pot plants.

Plant in regular potting mixture, keep the soil wet. Grow in diffused sun, warm temperature, and in low to moderate humdity.

By the way, RAIN WATER is the best food for any plant!
